How it Works: The Old Testament readings are placed as chronologically as possible (even the Psalms are read where they belong in Israel's history when feasible, and this is why some prophets -- notably Jeremiah -- appear to be "out of order"). The only exception is Job, probably the oldest book in the Bible, but placed at the Schedule's end because it is hard to fit elsewhere. The New Testament readings space the Gospels out throughout the year to keep the reader constantly coming back to the life and teachings of Jesus. Always do the reading in the order it appears on the Schedule. For example, if a reading from Chronicles appears before Kings, read from Chronicles first.



CLAIMS TO FAME: Contains the stories from the birth of Moses through the 40 years of the Exodus.

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- Moses at the Burning Bush
- The Ten Plagues of Egypt
- Moses parts the Red Sea
- The Ten Commandments

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

"You shall have no other gods before me."
Exodus 20:3

"God said to Moses, "I AM WHO I AM. This is what you are to say to the Israelites: 'I AM has sent me to you.'" **Exodus 3:14**

Important Points about the Book:

- So many exciting Bible stories are found in Exodus! Exodus starts 280 years after the death of Joseph in Egypt with the birth of Moses. Moses was born in 1526 BC. Chapters 1-2 cover events before Moses was called to lead Israel out of Egypt.
- Chapter 3 covers the story of the Burning Bush and Moses' call
- Chapters 7-12 cover the Ten Plagues of Egypt, including the Passover, established with the 10th plague that called for the death of the oldest child of both man and beast.
- Chapters 13 begins the Exodus
- Chapter 20 contains the 10 Commandments.
- The stories are basically over for the remaining 20 chapters, except that chapter 32 contains the story of the Golden Calf. The other chapters contain laws and instructions for the constructing of the first tabernacle. A tabernacle was like a temple, only portable in the desert.



BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

EXODUS

Exodus means “departure.” The Book of Exodus is about Israel’s departure from the south, where they were slaves, back to Canaan, where Father Abraham was originally sent by God 500 years earlier. After Israel came back, they would have to take the land that would become their nation. They thought the journey would last a few months. It lasted 40 years. Why? Because the people needed to become strong and faithful. The first half of the Book of Exodus is their journey. The second half is rules and instructions.

1. **Moses led the Exodus from this country.** (*Exodus 1:14*)
2. **One of the two midwives who refused to kill Hebrew babies, as Pharaoh had decreed.** (*Exodus 1:15-17*)
3. **This person gave Moses his name.** (*Exodus 2:5-10*)
4. **This was Moses’ wife’s name.** (*Exodus 2:15-22*)
5. **The river where Moses floated as a baby was named this.** (*Exodus 2:3*)
6. **The mount where Moses saw the burning bush was named this.** (*Exodus 3:1*)
7. **Moses’ older brother and also a prophet went by this name.** (*Exodus 4:14*)
8. **God used Moses to part a sea by this name.** (*Exodus 15:4*)
9. **God made a special promise to Israel at the foot of a mountain in this desert, both of which have the same name.** (*Exodus 19:1-6*)
10. **The Fourth Commandment given to Moses tells us to keep this holy.** (*Exodus 20:8*)



AUTHOR: MOSES

WRITTEN: 1445 BC

Covering the time period 1445 BC- 70 AD. The laws applied until shortly after the death of Christ, when the temple was destroyed in 70 AD.

CLAIMS TO FAME:

Contains many laws for the Hebrew people. It is not often studied by Christians because Jesus freed us from the letter of the law.


MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

For the life of a creature is in the blood, and I have given it to you to make atonement for yourselves on the altar; it is the blood that makes atonement for one's life. **Leviticus 17:11**

Do not seek revenge or bear a grudge against anyone among your people, but love your neighbor as yourself. I am the LORD. **Leviticus 19:18**

Important Points about the Book:

- Leviticus is mostly laws that kept the Hebrew people safe, healthy, and peaceful.
- It is decreed in this book that priests shall be members of the tribe of Levi and descendants of Moses' brother Aaron.
- Moses describes things that are considered "unclean," such as various animals and insects. God's purpose was to protect people from germs and unhealthy living.
- Moses teaches the Day of Atonement. It is a ceremony that takes place only once a year. The High Priest enters into the Holy of Holies (the most special part of the tabernacle) and offers a sacrifice to God for sins of the entire nation. No one else could go in there.




BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

LEVITICUS

Leviticus is mostly laws that kept the Hebrew people safe, healthy, and peaceful. It was written by Moses during the Exodus out of Egypt. Moses describes things that are considered "unclean," such as various animals and insects. God's purpose was to protect people from germs and unhealthy living. Moses also taught about the Day of Atonement. It is a ceremony that takes place only once a year. The High Priest enters into the Holy of Holies (the most special part of the tabernacle) and offers a sacrifice to God for sins of the entire nation. No one else could go in there.

1. **God established this part of living creatures to be an atonement for sins.** (*Leviticus 17:11*)
2. **You should not seek this toxic thing against others.** (*Leviticus 19:18*)
3. **This verse encourages you to give a tenth of what you earn to the Lord. That offering features a similar word that means "tenth."** (*Leviticus 27:30*)
4. **Animals that do not have fins and scales are considered to be in this state.** (*Leviticus 11:12*)
5. **A man is discouraged from marrying this sort of relative.** (*Leviticus 20:21*)
6. **This is the first of several birds not to be eaten because they were unclean, or more susceptible to germs.** (*Leviticus 11:13-15*)
7. **Animals that move along the ground or considered scavengers were considered germ and unclean, including this one.** (*Leviticus 11:29*)
8. **To prevent the spread of disease, an infectious skin disease could be treated by isolating a person for this long.** (*Leviticus 13:21*)



AUTHOR: MANY:
King David was the strongest contributor.

WRITTEN: 1400-450 BC

Psalms is written for all eras to enjoy and was meant to be timeless.

CLAIMS TO FAME: **Of the 150 Psalms, over half were written by King David**

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

Yeah, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; for thou art with me. ***Psalms 23:4***

Take delight in the LORD and he will give you the desires of your heart. ***Psalms 37:4***

Important Points about the Book:

- Psalms are poetry, generally meant to be put to music, though the translations out of their original and beautiful language often makes that hard today.
- Individual psalms were written as early as Moses' time, around 1450 BC. More were added through the time of David and Solomon around 1000 BC. Additions continued after the Babylonian captivity around 500 BC. That means the writing spanned nearly 1,000 years.
- The Psalms have always been quite popular because they apply to every time and every person. Psalms of sorrow, psalms of praise, prophetic psalms, and words of encouragement still make this one of the most popular books in the Bible.



BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

PSALMS

Of the 150 Psalms, over half were written by King David. Individual psalms were written as early as Moses' time, around 1450 BC. More were added through the time of David and Solomon around 1000 BC. Additions continued after the Babylonian captivity around 500 BC. That means the writing spanned nearly 1,000 years. They have always been quite popular because they apply to every time and every person.

1. **The current most popular Psalm in the Bible speaks of God's word being this. (*Psalm 119:105*)**
2. **To refute skeptics who say they've never seen God, people read this Psalm verse, which says God is evident in this beautiful sight. (*Psalm 19:1*)**
3. **This very first verse of the Psalms declares that we are blessed if we don't walk in step with the wicked, or stand in the way that sinners take, or sit in the company of these types of people. (*Psalm 1:1*)**
4. **This Psalm is often used in defense of a pro-life political stance. It states that God has known you since you were in this. (*Psalm 139:13*)**
5. **This Psalm declares that if you delight yourself in God, he will give you desires that exist here (*Psalm 37:4*)**
6. **People often refer to this Psalm when they have to wait for things and become impatient. It tells you to do this, while knowing God is at work. (*Psalm 46:10*)**
7. **Written by King David, this most famous Psalm features the lines, "the Lord is my shepherd, I shall not..." Finish this famous line. (*Psalm 23:1*)**
8. **People recite this Psalm by King David when they have done something for which they feel a lot of guilt. It encourages God to create this in us. (*Psalm 51:10*)**

AUTHOR: APOSTLE PAUL



WRITTEN: 60-62 AD

Old Testament: 39 Books

10 Testament: 27 Books

CLAIMS TO FAME: Contains the famed passages about the “armor of God.”

PROBLEMS OR ISSUES THIS BOOK IS ADDRESSING:

- Paul visited Ephesus twice. The second time, a rich silversmith, Demetrius, found his business suffering greatly because people were converting to Christianity. He built silver for the idols, and suddenly there wasn't as much demand. There was a near-riot that led Paul to leave Ephesus, but only after he had done much to stabilize and grow the Christian community there. He wrote this letter while in prison in Rome to encourage them.

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

For our struggle is not against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the powers of this dark world and against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly realms. ***Ephesians 6:12***

For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do. ***Ephesians 2:10***

Important Points about the Book:


- In Chapters 1-3, Paul greatly encourages believers, calling them “adopted sons” of God, and saying things like God picked believers before the foundation of the world.
- In Chapters 4-5, he encourages believers to walk in a manner worthy of their calling. Chapter 6 is where he tells the church how to do this, by putting on the full armor of God.

EPHESIANS

Paul wrote several New Testament epistles while under house arrest in Rome, and Ephesians is one of them. The others are Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon. He was arrested several times for preaching the gospel, but these four books are known as “the prison gospels,” as it was a very high-energy couple of years for Paul in the writing department. The book dates around 60 AD.

Paul met his goal of encouraging believers in Ephesus, calling them “adopted sons” of God and saying things like God picked believers before the foundation of the world. He encourages believers to walk in a manner worthy of their calling.

1. **This famous salvation scripture tells us that we are not saved by our deeds. Rather we are saved by this, which is a free gift from God.** (*Ephesians 2:8*)
2. **Our struggle is not against flesh and blood. It is against rulers, authorities, powers of this dark world, and these, which exist in the heavenlies.** (*Ephesians 6:12*)
3. **We are God’s handiwork, created in Christ to do these, which God prepared in advance.** (*Ephesians 2:10*)
4. **God chose us to do his good works before this time.** (*Ephesians 1:4*)
5. **God is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work in this place.** (*Ephesians 3:20*)
6. **You are no longer foreigners, but members of this.** (*Ephesians 2:19*)
7. **We must speak the truth, but must do so while having this.** (*Ephesians 4:15*)



AUTHOR: APOSTLE PAUL

WRITTEN: 60-62 AD

Old Testament: 39 Books

New Testament: 27 Books

CLAIMS TO FAME: Considered to be one of the most encouraging epistles for those under trial

PROBLEMS OR ISSUES THIS BOOK IS ADDRESSING:

- The Apostle Paul did not write Philippians to address a crisis, like he did with other letters. Instead, he wrote to express his appreciation and affection for the believers in the church of Philippi. More than any other church, the people offered Paul support for his ministry in payments, gifts, and comfort.

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. **Philippians 4:6**

I can do all this through him who gives me strength. **Philippians 4:13**

"He who began a good work in you will perfect it until the day of Christ Jesus" **Philippians 1:6**



Important Points about the Book:

- This book begins with Paul describing his imprisonment and the situation in Rome. He is under house arrest while writing this and three other epistles. He explains that he believes he will be delivered, and goes on to encourage the church of Philippi to live lives worthy of the gospel. Lastly, he explains that he is sending Timothy to them and wishes them blessings and peace, warning against legalism.

PHILIPPIANS

This book begins with Paul describing his imprisonment in Rome. He was under house arrest while writing this and three other epistles. Paul wrote this letter to express his appreciation and affection for the believers in the church of Philippi. More than any other church, the people offered Paul support for his ministry in payments, gifts, and comfort. The book was penned between 60 and 62 AD.

1. **God tells us not to be anxious about our problems. That is a tough assignment. But in this popular verse, he tells us to use prayer, supplication, and this in solving problems.**
(Philippians 4:6)
2. **We can feel angry, insecure, even hateful over certain problems in life. Here is a verse to help distract us from toxic thinking. Think of whatever is true, noble, right, pure, and virtuous, and then do this.** *(Philippians 4:8)*
3. **We can be confident in God, because we don't have to do all the work to grow spiritually. He is the one who will bring us to this point.** *(Philippians 1:6)*
4. **Don't do anything out of selfishness or conceit, but instead we should think of others in this way.** *(Philippians 2:3)*
5. **Paul could handle a lot of hardship because he was filled with the fruit of this.** *(Philippians 1:11)*
6. **The peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard these parts of us through Jesus.** *(Philippians 4:7)*
7. **Philippians is one of the books Paul wrote while imprisoned. He explained to the guards that he was in chains for this.**
(Philippians 1:13)

HEBREWS

AUTHOR: UNKNOWN



WRITTEN: AD 67-69

Old Testament: 39 Books

New Testament: 27 **19** Books

CLAIMS TO FAME: It is the only book in the New Testament where scholars are unsure of its author. It contains a rundown of Old Testament figures to show how they believed by faith in the Messiah, even though Christ had not come yet.

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see. *Hebrews 11:1*

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us...
Hebrews 12:1

Important Points about the Book:

- The author of Hebrews tried very hard to paint an image of Jesus as divine.
- According to Hebrews, Jesus has a role that is higher than the angels. He has created a clear path to the throne room of God. He is a priest who intercedes to us before the Father. He is the only path to salvation. He was a sacrifice for the sinfulness of mankind. All of these ideas are put forth in Hebrews.
- The book was written around the time when the evil leader Nero was feeding Christians to the lions and other disturbing things. Thus it was a great letter of hope and help for people considering giving up the faith.

HEBREWS

Hebrews is the only book in the New Testament where scholars are unsure of its author, though some feel it was written by Apostle Paul. The book was written around the time when the evil leader Nero was persecuting Christians and putting many to death. Nero reigned between 37 and 68 AD, and the book dates itself to that period. Thus it still serves as a great letter of hope and help for people who are under a great deal of pressure.

1. **Faith is defined as the confidence in what we hope for and the assurance of this.** *(Hebrews 11:1)*
2. **This verse explains that the Bible isn't just a book, but it is this.** *(Hebrews 4:12)*
3. **It is impossible to please God without having this.** *(Hebrews 11:6)*
4. **We should be content with what we have and to be free from the love of this.** *(Hebrews 13:5)*
5. **Jesus is the same yesterday, today, and this.** *(Hebrews 13:8)*
6. **We need to greatly encourage each other towards love and this.** *(Hebrews 10:24)*
7. **It is very important to try to live in peace with these people.** *(Hebrews 12:14)*
8. **Whenever we feel tired of doing good, we can remember the people cheering for us in heaven. They are referred to by this name.** *(Hebrews 12:1)*
