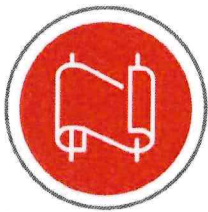

How it Works: The Old Testament readings are placed as chronologically as possible (even the Psalms are read where they belong in Israel's history when feasible, and this is why some prophets -- notably Jeremiah -- appear to be "out of order"). The only exception is Job, probably the oldest book in the Bible, but placed at the Schedule's end because it is hard to fit elsewhere. The New Testament readings space the Gospels out throughout the year to keep the reader constantly coming back to the life and teachings of Jesus. Always do the reading in the order it appears on the Schedule. For example, if a reading from Chronicles appears before Kings, read from Chronicles first.

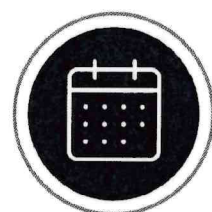

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- Elijah is swept up to heaven.
- Elisha raises a boy from the dead.

- Jerusalem is plundered by the Babylonians, and the Great Exile begins.

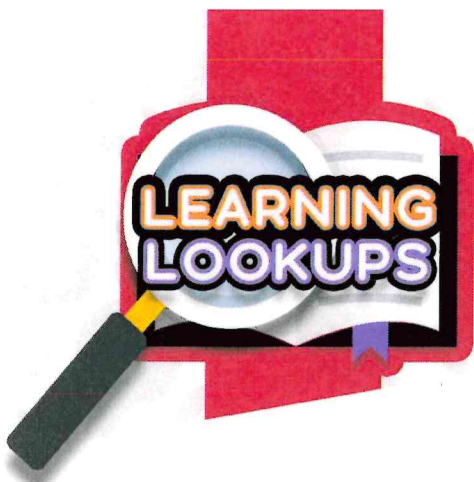
MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

The company of the prophets at Bethel came out to Elisha and asked, "Do you know that the LORD is going to take your master from you today?" "Yes, I know," Elisha replied... **2 Kings 2:3**

Elijah answered the captain, "If I am a man of God, may fire come down from heaven and consume you and your fifty men!" Then fire fell from heaven and consumed the captain and his men. **2 Kings 1:10**

Important Points about the Book:

- 2 Kings begins where 1 Kings leaves off.
- Chapters 2 through 7 cover the ministry of the prophet Elisha after Elijah is taken up to heaven. Chapter 13 covers the death of Elisha.
- The book covers the reigns of many kings of Israel and Judah, telling short stories about some of the most notable, good and evil. It ends with Chapter 25 and the Babylonian invasion of Judah, when Solomon's temple was destroyed.



BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

1 & 2 KINGS

First Kings continues the stories of Samuel 1 and 2. First Kings covers the reign of David's son, King Solomon, known as the wisest and wealthiest man alive. It contains the stories of the important prophet Elijah, who appeared at the Transfiguration with Jesus 800 years later. Second Kings covers the reigns of many kings of Israel and Judah, good and evil. It ends with the Babylonian invasion of Judah and the end of the line of kings.

1. **Solomon had more wisdom than people from the east or from this country.** (1 Kings 4:30)
2. **This prophet asked God to light a fire on a totally drenched altar.** (1 Kings 18:36-37)
3. **This is what the evil King Ahab called Elijah, just before Elijah performed a great miracle and called off a three-year famine and drought.** (1 Kings 18:16-18)
4. **This place is where the prophet Elijah asked God to perform the miracle of lighting the drenched altar.** (1 Kings 18:19)
5. **This is the place where the prophet Elijah killed hundreds of false prophets of Baal.** (1 Kings 18:40)
6. **This man is recorded as one of the worst kings of Israel because he inspired almost all the kings that followed him to worship idols.** (1 Kings 13:33)
7. **This evil mother destroyed her whole family so she could be queen.** (2 Kings 11:1-3)
8. **This evil king was one of two who sacrificed their children to a false god.** (2 Kings 16:1-4)
9. **This prophet watched his best friend be taken away before dying.** (2 Kings 2:11-12)

CLAIMS TO FAME: Contains the history of King Solomon finishing the temple.

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- Solomon prays to God for wisdom instead of long life, power, or money, so he is given all.
- The Queen of Sheba visits Solomon.
- King Cyrus of Persia rebuilds the temple after releasing Israel from the Great Exile to Babylon.

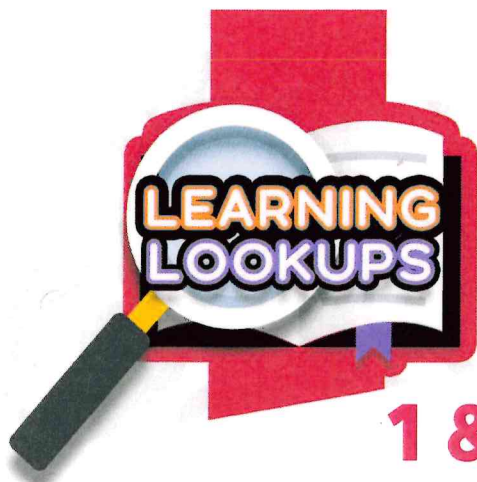
MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven, and I will forgive their sin and will heal their land. **2 Chronicles 7:14**

God said to Solomon, "Since this is your heart's desire and you have not asked for wealth, possessions or honor, nor for the death of your enemies, and since you have not asked for a long life but for wisdom and knowledge to govern my people over whom I have made you king, I therefore wisdom and knowledge will be given you. And I will also give you wealth, possessions and honor, such as no king who was before you ever had and none after you will have." **2 Chronicles 1:11-12**

Important Points about the Book:

- 2 Chronicles starts with the famous story of Solomon asking for wisdom. It continues with information and stories about Solomon building the Temple through Chapter 8.
- The Queen of Sheba visits Solomon in Chapter 9.
- 2 Chronicles covers the reigns of all the kings of Israel and Judah after the split of the united kingdom of Kings Saul, David, and Solomon.
- Like the Kings, this book gives little snippets about each king and notes whether they grieved or pleased the Lord. (Only a handful, all from Judah, pleased the Lord.)
- The closing chapter, 36, summarizes the 70 years of captivity in the Great Exile and also summarizes Cyrus, King of Persia, releasing the Jews to go home and his funding of the rebuilding of the Temple.



BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

1 & 2 CHRONICLES

Originally, the Chronicles were one combined book, not 1 and 2 Chronicles. The purpose of it was to present an entire history of Israel, starting with Adam. First Chronicles gives the history from Adam through King David. Second Chronicles covers the reign of King Solomon plus all the kings of Israel and Judah after the split of the united kingdom. Like the Kings, 2 Chronicles gives little snippets about each king and notes whether they grieved or pleased the Lord. (Only a handful, all from Judah, pleased the Lord.)

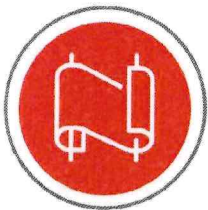
1. David shared with his son Solomon that he had been told by God not to build the temple. The reason was that he had done too much of this. *(1 Chronicles 22:7-8)*
2. Goliath the giant was killed by David. Later another soldier killed one of Goliath's brothers. The soldier's name was this. *(1 Chronicles 20:5)*
3. David's older brother Jonathan killed another giant who had one of the trademarks of giants, which was this. *(1 Chronicles 20:6-7)*
4. God's first temple was eventually built by this king. *(2 Chronicles 3:1-2)*
5. In King Solomon's famous prayer before becoming king, he impressed God by asking for this, instead of riches, power, or long life. *(2 Chronicles 1:10)*
6. This queen, still famous today, went to visit Solomon during his reign. *(2 Chronicles 9:1-2)*
7. This evil king sacrificed at least two of his children to false gods and practiced witchcraft. *(2 Chronicles 33:1-6)*
8. This king built up Israel's security and destroyed false idols. *(2 Chronicles 17:1-6)*

AUTHOR: THE PROPHET AMOS

Prophecies Come True in this Time Period: 722 BC -516 BC

CLAIMS TO FAME: Amos was a shepherd and not from a family of trained priests or prophets.

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- No stories are included in Amos, only firm judgments.

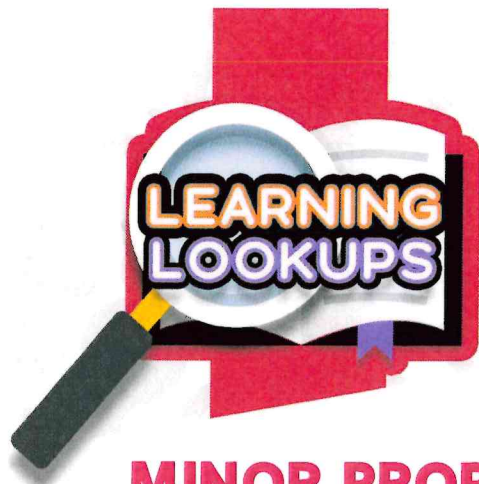
MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

Surely the Sovereign LORD does nothing without revealing his plan to his servants the prophets.
Amos 3:7

"I hate, I despise your religious festivals; I cannot stand your assemblies." **Amos 5:21**

Important Points about the Book:

- Amos was a shepherd. He lived with a group of shepherds in Tekoa, a small town 10 miles south of Jerusalem.
- Amos prophesied about 760 BC. Uzziah was king of Judah, and Jeroboam II was King of Israel. He was born in Judah but prophesied in Israel. He predicted the overthrow of the Kingdom of Israel by the Assyrians, which happened in 722 BC.
- He also predicted the doom of Judah and the doom of many surrounding nations. He had a short ministry, though his book contains nine chapters.



BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

MINOR PROPHETS HOSEA, AMOS & MICAH

Hosea, Amos, and Micah had in common that they prophesied about the two invasions coming—one on Israel and one on Judah. Each prophesied around 20 years apart, between 775 and 725 BC. The Assyrian invasion of Israel was coming fast. The Babylonian invasion of Judah was 200 years off. They also are not in chronological order. In this second group, Hosea's order is #1 Minor Prophet in the Bible. Amos is #3. Micah is #6.

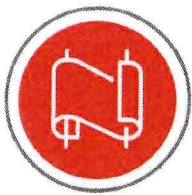
1. God told Hosea to do this thing, which reminded God of his relationship to Israel. (*Hosea 1:2*)
2. God says men are destroyed for lack of this. (*Hosea 4:6*)
3. Hosea also prophesied about the times of Christ. This famous verse in Hosea predicts Joseph and Mary taking Jesus to this country to escape King Herod's attempts to murder the Messiah. (*Hosea 11:1*)
4. We can have faith in God's direction, thanks to this promise. It states that God never does anything without also doing this. (*Amos 3:7*)
5. When Amos prophesied the rebuilding of Jerusalem after the Babylonian invasion, he referred to the city by this name. (*Amos 9:11*)
6. Like Hosea, Micah prophesied about the times of Christ. He made the famous prophecy about Jesus' birth by naming this place. (*Micah 5:2*)
7. Micah accurately predicted the destruction of this city, which happened around 120 years later. (*Micah 3:12*)

CLAIMS TO FAME: God told Hosea to marry a woman who would never be faithful, because the marriage is like God and Israel.

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- Hosea is told to marry a woman who would not be faithful to represent Israel and its behavior toward God.

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

"When Israel was a child, I loved him, and out of Egypt I called my son." **Hosea 11:1**

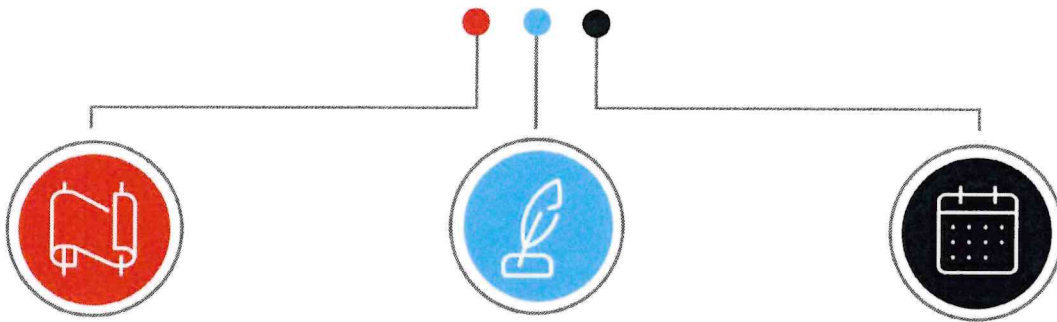
My people are destroyed from lack of knowledge. "Because you have rejected knowledge, I also reject you as my priests; because you have ignored the law of your God, I also will ignore your children." **Hosea 4:6**

Important Points about the Book:

- Hosea directed his early prophecies to Jeroboam II, the 13th king of the Northern Kingdom around 750 BC. Israel was full of idolatry. God planned to allow Assyria to invade if people didn't repent. They didn't.
- He prophesied at the same time as Isaiah and about 10 years after Jonah was swallowed by the great fish and told to prophesy to Nineveh.
- Hosea obeyed God and married a woman who would not be faithful to him. He thus was able to prophesy with great passion about how God felt about all Israel's unfaithfulness.
- The book contains warnings of the coming Assyrian invasion on the Northern Kingdom and the Babylonian invasion of the Southern Kingdom. The northern invasion was right around the corner, occurring in 722 BC. The invasion of the Southern Kingdom by the Babylonians, would happen 150 years later. Nobody listened to Hosea.
- This book contains the famous prophecy about Jesus living for a while in Egypt as a child (see Hosea 11:1 above). His parents took him there when Joseph was told in a dream that King Herod was trying to kill the young Messiah. They returned from Egypt upon Herod's death, as noted in Matthew 2:15.

ISAIAH

Prophecies Come True in this Time Period: 700 BC – 25 AD

CLAIMS TO FAME: This prophet is said to have written the most prophecies about the coming of Jesus.

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

Isaiah contains no stories. However, it is loaded with prophecy that closely matches the life of Jesus, and it has been used as a source of proof. Here are some prophecies it contains:

- The announcement of Christ's coming (Isaiah 40:3-5)
- The virgin birth (7:14)
- Christ proclaiming the good news (61:1)
- Christ's death as a sin sacrifice (52:13-53:12)
- The second coming of Christ (60:2-3)

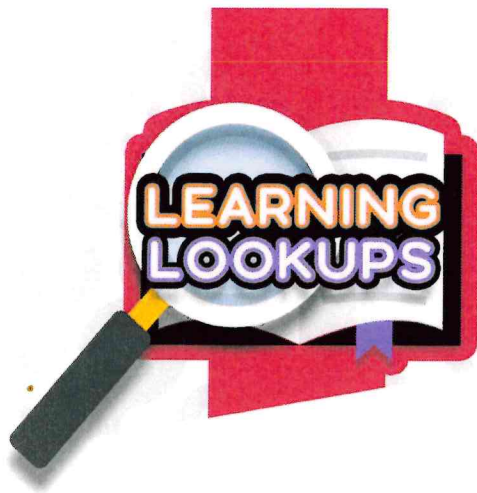
MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. **Isaiah 9:6**

Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel. **Isaiah 7:14**

Important Points about the Book:

- Isaiah prophesied under the reign of four Judean kings: Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz, and Hezekiah. He most likely met his death under a fifth, the evil King Manasseh. Many scholars believe the prophet referred to in Hebrews 11:37 is Isaiah. It says that one of the prophets was slain in two.
- Early chapters give detailed judgments against the people who have turned their backs on the Lord. Later chapters show God's faithfulness, even though mankind is stubborn and sinful.
- Unlike some of the other prophets, Isaiah does not prophesy about our times or the end times. He focuses much on the people of his day (who were about to be exiled if they didn't straighten out, and on the times of Christ).



BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

ISAIAH

The Prophet Isaiah is said to have written the most prophecies about the coming of Jesus. Early chapters give detailed judgments against the people who turn their backs on the Lord. Later chapters show God's faithfulness, even though mankind is stubborn and sinful.

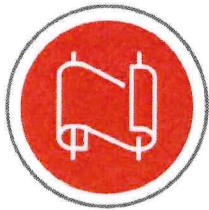
1. This famous announcement of Christ's coming features a line used frequently by John the Baptist over 600 years later. It says to prepare this. (*Isaiah 40:3-5*)
2. This famous prophecy reveals that Jesus will be born of this type of woman. (*Isaiah 7:14*)
3. Here is a prophecy Jesus recited near the start of his ministry. It says he has come to proclaim this. (*Isaiah 61:1*)
4. Christ's death as a sin sacrifice is predicted in this verse. It also predicts that he would suffer this. (*Isaiah 52:14*)
5. There was an eclipse during the crucifixion of Christ. This verse predicts it, saying that a certain condition would fall across the earth, which is this. (*Isaiah 60:2*)
6. This famous verse predicts that eventually, Christ would be responsible for the government. It speaks of him by many names, including this. (*Isaiah 9:6*)
7. Isaiah 40:31 is often referenced by people who have become very tired in a trial. It says that if you wait on the Lord, you will mount up with wings like this bird's. (*Isaiah 40:31*)
8. This entire chapter of Isaiah makes strong references to the crucifixion. One verse states that by his wounds, we come into this state (*Isaiah 53:5*).

CLAIMS TO FAME: Contains the famous scripture about the birth of Christ in Bethlehem.

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- No stories are included in this book of prophecy

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

"But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, though you are small among the clans of Judah, out of you will come for me one who will be ruler over Israel, whose origins are from of old, from ancient times."
Micah 5:2

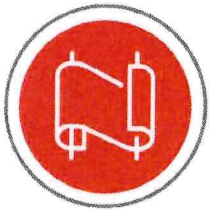
He has shown all you people what is good. And what does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God. **Micah 6:8**

Important Points about the Book:

- Micah prophesied at the same time as Isaiah and Hosea. He prophesied during the tragic and historic years surrounding the Assyrian invasion of the Northern Kingdom. Micah predicted the event in Micah 1:6, and it came to pass between 10 and 15 years later, in 722 BC.
- Micah's earlier prophecies concern judgment on the kingdoms of Israel and Judah for idolatry. His later prophecies concern the future kingdom that Jesus spoke of.

PSALMS

AT-A-GLANCE

AUTHOR: MANY:

King David was the strongest contributor.

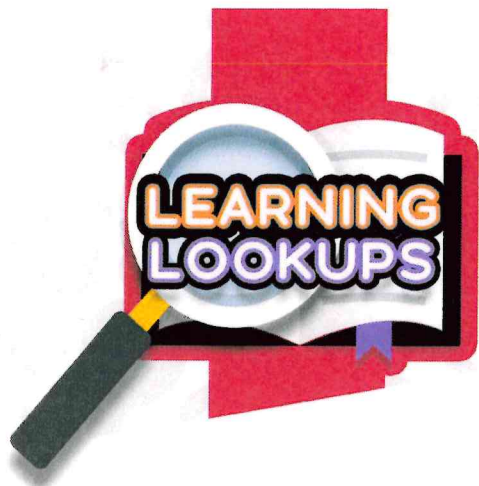
MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

Yeah, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; for thou art with me. ***Psalms 23:4***

Take delight in the LORD and he will give you the desires of your heart. ***Psalms 37:4***

Important Points about the Book:

- Psalms are poetry, generally meant to be put to music, though the translations out of their original and beautiful language often makes that hard today.
- Individual psalms were written as early as Moses' time, around 1450 BC. More were added through the time of David and Solomon around 1000 BC. Additions continued after the Babylonian captivity around 500 BC. That means the writing spanned nearly 1,000 years.
- The Psalms have always been quite popular because they apply to every time and every person. Psalms of sorrow, psalms of praise, prophetic psalms, and words of encouragement still make this one of the most popular books in the Bible.



BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

PSALMS

Of the 150 Psalms, over half were written by King David. Individual psalms were written as early as Moses' time, around 1450 BC. More were added through the time of David and Solomon around 1000 BC. Additions continued after the Babylonian captivity around 500 BC. That means the writing spanned nearly 1,000 years. They have always been quite popular because they apply to every time and every person.

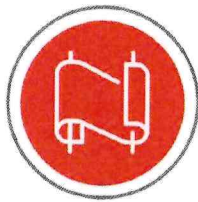
1. The current most popular Psalm in the Bible speaks of God's word being this. (*Psalm 119:105*)
2. To refute skeptics who say they've never seen God, people read this Psalm verse, which says God is evident in this beautiful sight. (*Psalm 19:1*)
3. This very first verse of the Psalms declares that we are blessed if we don't walk in step with the wicked, or stand in the way that sinners take, or sit in the company of these types of people. (*Psalm 1:1*)
4. This Psalm is often used in defense of a pro-life political stance. It states that God has known you since you were in this. (*Psalm 139:13*)
5. This Psalm declares that if you delight yourself in God, he will give you desires that exist here (*Psalm 37:4*)
6. People often refer to this Psalm when they have to wait for things and become impatient. It tells you to do this, while knowing God is at work. (*Psalm 46:10*)
7. Written by King David, this most famous Psalm features the lines, "the Lord is my shepherd, I shall not..." Finish this famous line. (*Psalm 23:1*)
8. People recite this Psalm by King David when they have done something for which they feel a lot of guilt. It encourages God to create this in us. (*Psalm 51:10*)

CLAIMS TO FAME: **First Gospel in the New Testament**

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- The visit of the Magi to the baby Jesus
- Herod's slaughter of the infants, and Jesus' parents fleeing with him to Egypt to escape
- Jesus tells Peter that he will be primary in his building of the Church (Upon this rock...)
- Jesus pays tax by his disciples finding a fish with a coin in its mouth.
- The story of Judas' suicide

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

"Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest." **Matthew 11:28**

"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." **Matthew 28:19**

Important Points about the Book:

- Matthew was writing to Jews as opposed to Gentiles, which is why his gospel often quotes the Old Testament to show how prophecy was fulfilled. The other gospels don't do that.
- The book contains a genealogy that dates back to Abraham. It differs from a genealogy in early Luke. Some say that is because one is a list of legal parentage and the other is a bloodline. Because women died in childbirth often and men had come to have less longevity, often there were remarriages and adoptions. The list in Matthew contained names of legal parents, or those who were the parents at the time a person came of age.
- The book is also famous for containing the Great Commission, listed above in Matthew 28:19.

MATTHEW

Matthew is the first gospel and was written by Jesus' apostle by that name. It was written around 60 AD. Matthew was writing to Jews as opposed to gentiles, which is why his gospel often quotes the Old Testament to show how prophecy was fulfilled. The other gospels aren't as much about that.

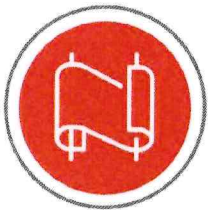
1. In this famous passage, Jesus brings hope to all by promising to be with us always, even until the end of this. *(Matthew 28:20)*
2. In this beloved passage known as the Great Commission, Jesus says to make this of the people in all nations. *(Matthew 28:19)*
3. Matthew had this occupation before becoming an apostle, and probably was a ruthless person prior to his salvation. *(Matthew 9:9)*
4. The verse attests that following Christ makes life easier and more joyful, though sometimes it feels like the opposite. Jesus offers this to the weary and heavy-laden. *(Matthew 11:28)*
5. Jesus called Peter a strange term when they first talked about the church. It implied that Peter would always be known as the apostle who started the church. This is the word Jesus used. *(Matthew 16:18)*
6. Jesus says he came to fulfill the law and as well as the words given by these special people. *(Matthew 5:17)*
7. Jesus called this the greatest commandment. *(Matthew 22:37)*

CLAIMS TO FAME: Contains the famous chapter about “love,” which is included at nearly every Christian wedding. It is 1 Corinthians 13.

PROBLEMS OR ISSUES THIS BOOK IS ADDRESSING:

- Paul heard there was quarrelling in the church. He was disappointed. He had spent 18 months with the Corinthian Christians and they had been doing well. He wanted to help them solve their quarreling.

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud... **1 Corinthians 13:4**

So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God. **1 Corinthians 10:31**

Important Points about the Book:

- In Chapters 1-4 Paul talks about the quarrels he's heard about and offers advice.
- In Chapters 5-11 Paul exposes sins he's heard are already infesting the church. They had to do with sexual immorality, filing lawsuits against each other, and other things.
- In Chapters 12-15, he helps them understand difficult doctrines such as what speaking in tongues means.
- In Chapters 15-16, he preaches the pure gospel again and encourages these believers to hold fast to what is good.

1 & 2 CORINTHIANS

Paul wrote 1 Corinthians to address bad behavior and quarreling in the church. He wanted to teach them about discipleship and send them instructions for living according to Christ's example.

Second Corinthians is actually the fourth letter Paul had written to this feisty group of believers. Two of the letters were lost in history. After three bad reports of their behavior, Paul finally got a good one. He wrote 2 Corinthians to encourage them on their journey toward the kingdom of God.

The books were written about a year apart, possibly 55 and 56 AD.

1. **We should not be deceived and think that wrongdoers will inherit this.** (*1 Corinthians 6:9*)
2. **Love is patient, love is kind. Love does not envy or do this.** (*1 Corinthians 13:4*)
3. **Our bodies are to be like this for the Holy Spirit.** (*1 Corinthians 6:19*)
4. **All people experience temptation. However, God will never let us be tempted beyond this.** (*1 Corinthians 10:13*)
5. **We should not allow unbelievers to hold us back in our faith. But we can be held back if we get in this situation with them.** (*2 Corinthians 6:14*)
6. **Jesus gave up all his riches and became poor so that we might receive this blessing.** (*2 Corinthians 8:9*)
7. **We should not do good while rolling our eyes or having a bad attitude. Rather we should give in this way.** (*2 Corinthians 9:6*)
