

How it Works: The Old Testament readings are placed as chronologically as possible (even the Psalms are read where they belong in Israel's history when feasible, and this is why some prophets -- notably Jeremiah -- appear to be "out of order"). The only exception is Job, probably the oldest book in the Bible, but placed at the Schedule's end because it is hard to fit elsewhere. The New Testament readings space the Gospels out throughout the year to keep the reader constantly coming back to the life and teachings of Jesus. Always do the reading in the order it appears on the Schedule. For example, if a reading from Chronicles appears before Kings, read from Chronicles first.

# LEVITICUS

### CLAIMS TO FAME:

**Contains many laws for the Hebrew people. It is not often studied by Christians because Jesus freed us from the letter of the law.**


### MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

For the life of a creature is in the blood, and I have given it to you to make atonement for yourselves on the altar; it is the blood that makes atonement for one's life. **Leviticus 17:11**

Do not seek revenge or bear a grudge against anyone among your people, but love your neighbor as yourself. I am the LORD. **Leviticus 19:18**

## Important Points about the Book:

- Leviticus is mostly laws that kept the Hebrew people safe, healthy, and peaceful.
- It is decreed in this book that priests shall be members of the tribe of Levi and descendants of Moses' brother Aaron.
- Moses describes things that are considered "unclean," such as various animals and insects. God's purpose was to protect people from germs and unhealthy living.
- Moses teaches the Day of Atonement. It is a ceremony that takes place only once a year. The High Priest enters into the Holy of Holies (the most special part of the tabernacle) and offers a sacrifice to God for sins of the entire nation. No one else could go in there.




# BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

## LEVITICUS

Leviticus is mostly laws that kept the Hebrew people safe, healthy, and peaceful. It was written by Moses during the Exodus out of Egypt. Moses describes things that are considered "unclean," such as various animals and insects. God's purpose was to protect people from germs and unhealthy living. Moses also taught about the Day of Atonement. It is a ceremony that takes place only once a year. The High Priest enters into the Holy of Holies (the most special part of the tabernacle) and offers a sacrifice to God for sins of the entire nation. No one else could go in there.

1. **God established this part of living creatures to be an atonement for sins.** (*Leviticus 17:11*)
2. **You should not seek this toxic thing against others.** (*Leviticus 19:18*)
3. **This verse encourages you to give a tenth of what you earn to the Lord. That offering features a similar word that means "tenth."** (*Leviticus 27:30*)
4. **Animals that do not have fins and scales are considered to be in this state.** (*Leviticus 11:12*)
5. **A man is discouraged from marrying this sort of relative.** (*Leviticus 20:21*)
6. **This is the first of several birds not to be eaten because they were unclean, or more susceptible to germs.** (*Leviticus 11:13-15*)
7. **Animals that move along the ground or considered scavengers were considered gemy and unclean, including this one.** (*Leviticus 11:29*)
8. **To prevent the spread of disease, an infectious skin disease could be treated by isolating a person for this long.** (*Leviticus 13:21*)

**CLAIMS TO FAME:** The famous “40 years” of desert wandering is established in Numbers for the Hebrew people. Israel could have been a nation after two or three years, but Numbers shows them being terrible fighters with little to no faith, so God sends them to wander and build maturity and strength.

### FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- Spies saw giants in the land Moses wanted to invade, and grieved the Lord with their lack of faith;
- An enemy, Balak, easily taught the people of Israel to worship Baal, a false god, and they upset God so badly that 24,000 of them died.


### MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

God is not a human, that he should lie, not a human being, that he should change his mind. Does he speak and then not act? Does he promise and not fulfill? **Numbers 23:19**

But as for you, your bodies will fall in this wilderness. Your children will be shepherds here for forty years, suffering for your unfaithfulness, until the last of your bodies lies in the wilderness. **Numbers 14:32-33**

## Important Points about the Book:

- Numbers takes the reader on the long journey through a desert that lasted 40 years because the people failed tests of endurance, ethics, good judgment, and faith.
- There are some long lists in this book, including two censuses.
- Numbers shows how God wanted to make the Hebrew people strong, but they were very resistant complainers. Hence, in Numbers 14 is where God gave the sentence that they would wander for 40 years.



# BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

## NUMBERS

The Book of Numbers was written by Moses during the Exodus. Numbers shows how God wanted to make the Hebrew people strong, though they were very resistant complainers. Hence, Numbers 14 is where God gave the sentence that they would wander for decades. Israel could have been a nation after two or three years. But the Book of Numbers shows them being awful fighters at first with little to no faith. Therefore God sends them to wander and build maturity and strength. There are some long lists in this book, including two censuses.

1. **This famous verse has become a greeting worldwide over the centuries. It states, "The Lord bless you and ..."** (*Numbers 6:24*)
2. **The start of this famous institution for Israel is found here.** (*Numbers 1:3*)
3. **While speaking with God early on, Moses compared the people to a certain type of being.** (*Numbers 11:12*)
4. **This famous verse declares Moses' best trait, something he had more of than anyone on the planet.** (*Numbers 12:3*)
5. **Moses had a privilege that no other man had until Christ came, which was speaking with God in this way.** (*Numbers 12:8*)
6. **Israel's spies were acting like cowards. They came back from spying and reported to Moses that people of gigantic size were living in the future Promised Land, and their formal name was this.** (*Numbers 13:31-33*)
7. **This is the length of God's sentence on Israel to remain in the desert, because of their lack of faith, courage, and vision.** (*Numbers 14:34*)
8. **Moses' sister by this name was kept outside the camp for seven days after she contracted leprosy.** (*Numbers 12:15*)




### MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

Let no one be found among you who sacrifices their son or daughter in the fire, who practices divination or sorcery, interprets omens, engages in witchcraft. **Deuteronomy 18:10**

Since then, no prophet has risen in Israel like Moses, whom the Lord knew face to face. **Deuteronomy 34:10**

## Important Points about the Book:

- The Book of Deuteronomy contains a repeat of all the Mosaic laws, plus the death of Moses. It is the only book in the first five to record Moses' death.
- The children who had left Egypt were adults when Deuteronomy was written. They were quite ready to battle for the Promised Land. Deuteronomy repeats the laws in other books, specifically directing it to this new generation.
- The last few chapters describe Moses' final blessing on the children of Israel as well as his death (which must have been written by another person).



# BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

## DEUTERONOMY

The Book of Deuteronomy contains a repeat of all the Mosaic laws, plus an account of the death of Moses. It is the only book to record Moses' death. The children who had left Egypt were adults when Deuteronomy was written. They were quite ready to battle for the Promised Land. Deuteronomy repeats the laws in other books, specifically directing it to this new generation.

**CLAIMS TO FAME:** This book begins the story of Israel as a nation and contains the first events to take place after the Exodus.

### FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- Joshua and the troops surrounded Jericho, blew trumpets, and shouted, which made the walls fall down. (Joshua 6)
- Rahab the harlot protected the spies of Israel, so she and her family were saved, and she married into one of the families in Israel. (Joshua 6)
- The sun stood still in the sky so Joshua and his men could see to fight. (Joshua 10:12-14)

### MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

"Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go." **Joshua 1:9**

But Joshua had commanded the army, "Do not give a war cry, do not raise your voices, do not say a word until the day I tell you to shout. Then shout!" **Joshua 6:10**

## Important Points about the Book:

- The first eight chapters of Joshua cover the first battle for Israel, which was Jericho. They also cover the battle to win Ai, which gave the nation two pieces of land.
- In Joshua 9 through 12, the army continues fighting with Joshua as their leader. They conquer and obtain more of the Promised Land, with one great miracle being the sun stopping in the sky.
- In the rest of the chapters, 13 to 24, Joshua and his team divide the lands they conquered among the tribes. In chapters 23 and 24, Joshua gives a farewell address and dies at age 110.






# BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

## JOSHUA

This book begins the story of Israel as a nation and contains the first events to take place after the Exodus. The first eight chapters of Joshua cover the first battle for Israel, which was Jericho. They also cover the battle to win Ai, which gave the nation two pieces of land. In the remaining chapters, Joshua's army conquers 31 kingdoms and divides the lands up among the tribes of Israel.

*(Joshua 6:17)*
- 2. The sun actually stood still in the sky so Joshua could win a huge battle against these people.** *(Joshua 10:12-13)*

- 4. A great promise is provided that should prevent us from experiencing this emotion often.** *(Joshua 1:9)*
- 5. The spies told their inside helper, Rahab, to hang this in her window so the army wouldn't kill her or her family.**  
*(Joshua 2:18)*
- 6. The Lord dried up this river so the army could cross over.**  
*(Joshua 4:23)*
- 7. This happened in Jericho so the troops could move in and slay the enemy.** *(Joshua 6:20)*
- 8. Joshua was around 80 years old when he led the army into the Promised Land, and he was this age when he died.**  
*(Joshua 24:29)*




### MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

Yeah, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; for thou art with me. ***Psalms 23:4***

Take delight in the LORD and he will give you the desires of your heart. ***Psalms 37:4***

## Important Points about the Book:

- Psalms are poetry, generally meant to be put to music, though the translations out of their original and beautiful language often makes that hard today.
- Individual psalms were written as early as Moses' time, around 1450 BC. More were added through the time of David and Solomon around 1000 BC. Additions continued after the Babylonian captivity around 500 BC. That means the writing spanned nearly 1,000 years.
- The Psalms have always been quite popular because they apply to every time and every person. Psalms of sorrow, psalms of praise, prophetic psalms, and words of encouragement still make this one of the most popular books in the Bible.



# BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

## PSALMS

Of the 150 Psalms, over half were written by King David. Individual psalms were written as early as Moses' time, around 1450 BC. More were added through the time of David and Solomon around 1000 BC. Additions continued after the Babylonian captivity around 500 BC. That means the writing spanned nearly 1,000 years. They have always been quite popular because they apply to every time and every person.

1. **The current most popular Psalm in the Bible speaks of God's word being this.** (*Psalms 119:105*)
2. **To refute skeptics who say they've never seen God, people read this Psalm verse, which says God is evident in this beautiful sight.** (*Psalms 19:1*)
3. **This very first verse of the Psalms declares that we are blessed if we don't walk in step with the wicked, or stand in the way that sinners take, or sit in the company of these types of people.** (*Psalms 1:1*)
4. **This Psalm is often used in defense of a pro-life political stance. It states that God has known you since you were in this.** (*Psalms 139:13*)
5. **This Psalm declares that if you delight yourself in God, he will give you desires that exist here** (*Psalms 37:4*)
6. **People often refer to this Psalm when they have to wait for things and become impatient. It tells you to do this, while knowing God is at work.** (*Psalms 46:10*)
7. **Written by King David, this most famous Psalm features the lines, "the Lord is my shepherd, I shall not..." Finish this famous line.** (*Psalms 23:1*)
8. **People recite this Psalm by King David when they have done something for which they feel a lot of guilt. It encourages God to create this in us.** (*Psalms 51:10*)



# HEBREWS

## AT-A-GLANCE

AUTHOR: UNKNOWN

WRITTEN: AD 67-69

Old Testament: 39 Books

New Testament: 27 **19** ks

**CLAIMS TO FAME:** It is the only book in the New Testament where scholars are unsure of its author. It contains a rundown of Old Testament figures to show how they believed by faith in the Messiah, even though Christ had not come yet.

## MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see. **Hebrews 11:1**

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us... **Hebrews 12:1**

## Important Points about the Book:

- The author of Hebrews tried very hard to paint an image of Jesus as divine.
- According to Hebrews, Jesus has a role that is higher than the angels. He has created a clear path to the throne room of God. He is a priest who intercedes to us before the Father. He is the only path to salvation. He was a sacrifice for the sinfulness of mankind. All of these ideas are put forth in Hebrews.
- The book was written around the time when the evil leader Nero was feeding Christians to the lions and other disturbing things. Thus it was a great letter of hope and help for people considering giving up the faith.

## HEBREWS

Hebrews is the only book in the New Testament where scholars are unsure of its author, though some feel it was written by Apostle Paul. The book was written around the time when the evil leader Nero was persecuting Christians and putting many to death. Nero reigned between 37 and 68 AD, and the book dates itself to that period. Thus it still serves as a great letter of hope and help for people who are under a great deal of pressure.

1. **Faith is defined as the confidence in what we hope for and the assurance of this.** *(Hebrews 11:1)*
2. **This verse explains that the Bible isn't just a book, but it is this.** *(Hebrews 4:12)*
3. **It is impossible to please God without having this.** *(Hebrews 11:6)*
4. **We should be content with what we have and to be free from the love of this.** *(Hebrews 13:5)*
5. **Jesus is the same yesterday, today, and this.** *(Hebrews 13:8)*
6. **We need to greatly encourage each other towards love and this.** *(Hebrews 10:24)*
7. **It is very important to try to live in peace with these people.** *(Hebrews 12:14)*
8. **Whenever we feel tired of doing good, we can remember the people cheering for us in heaven. They are referred to by this name.** *(Hebrews 12:1)*

# COLOSSIANS

WRITTEN: 60-62 AD

**CLAIMS TO FAME:** Famous for teaching us to be wary of false teachers.

### PROBLEMS OR ISSUES THIS BOOK IS ADDRESSING:

- The Colossian church was trying to mix Greek philosophy with Christian theology. The result was called Gnostic philosophy. Among other things, it taught that the physical world was evil and Jesus was a spirit and not a man.

### MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

For in him all things were created: things in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or powers or rulers or authorities; all things have been created through him and for him. **Colossians 1:16**

Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. **Colossians 3:12**

## Important Points about the Book:

- Paul begins this book by defending the authority of Jesus and warning against spiritual practices which are not of God. He tells the people that Jesus is divine. They were starting to say what many people say today, that he was simply a great prophet and teacher and there are other paths to contact with God the Father.
- In Chapters 3-4, he teaches the people about love. He feels if they put on the love of Christ they will stop getting distracted by false doctrines. He teaches believers how to live at home, how to manage family matters, and how to get along with other believers in Christ.

## COLOSSIANS

Paul wrote this letter to defend the authority of Jesus and to warn against spiritual practices which are not of God. He tells the people that Jesus is divine. They were starting to say what many people say today, that Jesus was simply a great prophet and teacher and there are other paths to contact with God the Father. Paul wanted to set the record straight. Jesus is our Savior.

He wrote the epistle while under house arrest in Rome, around 60 to 61 AD.

1. **Some people think God is hard to know. But this verse says that Jesus is “the image of the invisible God.” It also says Jesus was the firstborn over all of this. (Colossians 1:15)**
2. **Be clothed in compassion, kindness, humility, patience, and also this. (Colossians 3:12)**
3. **We have been rescued from the dominion of darkness! We are now part of this. (Colossians 1:13)**
4. **When we work on a task, whether it’s homework, a chore, or a good deed, we should do it all as if this were the case. (Colossians 3:23)**
5. **To “put to death” is another Biblical way of saying “resist temptations.” We should resist temptations to do with these. (Colossians 3:5)**
6. **We should let this to rule our hearts instead of fear, bitterness, or other toxic emotions. (Colossians 3:15)**
7. **We should devote ourselves to prayer, being watchful, and this also. (Colossians 4:2)**



## Important Points about the Book:




- Much of the material in Luke's gospel involves Jesus' dealings with individuals. Many are not wealthy or part of the acceptable society of their day. They include many sinners. Hence, Luke is considered a gospel of extremely good news—for the common man. This is why stories show up in Luke such as the Good Samaritan (who helps the injured man while religious leaders pass right by him). The conversations between the robbers on the cross with Jesus show the Lord's love for those who have committed crimes.
- While Matthew attempts to prove Christ's kingship, Luke shows him as the one who offers salvation to all humanity—Jew and Gentile alike.

# LUKE

Luke is considered a gospel of extremely good news for the common man. This is why stories are included such as the Good Samaritan (who helps an injured man while religious leaders pass right by him). The conversations between the robbers on the crosses near Jesus show the Lord's grace for those who have committed crimes.

While Matthew attempts to prove Christ's kingship, Luke shows him as the one who offers salvation to all humanity—Jew and gentile alike. It is thought to have been written shortly after the Gospel of Mark was completed, around 60 AD.

1. **God sent an angel to tell Mary that she would have the baby Jesus. This was the angel's name. (Luke 1:26-33)**
2. **Jesus made this all-time famous statement, naming a rule that everyone should follow to achieve peace on earth. It is to love you neighbor as you would love this. (Luke 10:27)**
3. **Mary and Joseph traveled to Bethlehem for a specific purpose, not intending to have a baby there! The purpose of the journey was this. (Luke 2:1-4)**
4. **At the start of his ministry, Jesus went into the wilderness and was tempted by Satan. He was in the wilderness for this amount of time. (Luke 4:2)**
5. **When he was 12, Jesus got separated from his parents while on a pilgrimage to Jerusalem. His parents found him here. (Luke 2:46)**
6. **Jesus tells us not to worry but instead to be like these animals. (Luke 12:24)**
7. **Jesus healed on a special day. The religious leaders were angry instead of happy for the person he healed. This was the day. (Luke 14:1-6)**
