How it Works: The Old Testament readings are placed as chronologically as possible (even the Psalms are read where they belong in Israel's history when feasible, and this is why some prophets -- notably Jeremiah -- appear to be "out of order"). The only exception is Job, probably the oldest book in the Bible, but placed at the Schedule's end because it is hard to fit elsewhere. The New Testament readings space the Gospels out throughout the year to keep the reader constantly coming back to the life and teachings of Jesus. Always do the reading in the order it appears on the Schedule. For example, if a reading from Chronicles appears before Kings, read from Chronicles first.

CLAIMS TO FAME:

It is the first book in the Bible and covers the longest span of time: Over 2,000 years!

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- Jacob sees the Ladder
- Jacob's name is changed to Israel

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:


In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. ***Genesis 1:1***

So God created human beings in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them. ***Genesis 1:27***

Genesis can be broken down into two parts:

1. Prehistory contains everything from Genesis 1 to 12, or everything until the birth of Father Abraham. The first part includes creation, the Great Flood and the Tower of Babel.
2. From Genesis 12 to 50 is the story of the Patriarchs. They include Abraham, his son Isaac, and Isaac's son Jacob. Jacob was also the father of Joseph, who is not considered a patriarch but is very important.

These men make up the start of the nation of Israel.



BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

GENESIS

The Book of Genesis is the first book in the Bible! It tells us a lot about creation and how the world got to be in a fallen state. It contains the stories of creation, Noah's Ark, and the Tower of Babel. That's up through Chapter 11. After that, the whole book is about the first four generations of God's chosen people and cool stuff that they did!

(*Genesis 4:3-8*)




3. **This mountain range is where Noah's ark landed.**



CLAIMS TO FAME: Of the 150 Psalms, over half were written by King David


MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

Yeah, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil; for thou art with me. ***Psalm 23:4***

Take delight in the LORD and he will give you the desires of your heart. ***Psalm 37:4***

Important Points about the Book:

- Psalms are poetry, generally meant to be put to music, though the translations out of their original and beautiful language often makes that hard today.
- Individual psalms were written as early as Moses' time, around 1450 BC. More were added through the time of David and Solomon around 1000 BC. Additions continued after the Babylonian captivity around 500 BC. That means the writing spanned nearly 1,000 years.
- The Psalms have always been quite popular because they apply to every time and every person. Psalms of sorrow, psalms of praise, prophetic psalms, and words of encouragement still make this one of the most popular books in the Bible.



BOOKS OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

PSALMS

Of the 150 Psalms, over half were written by King David. Individual psalms were written as early as Moses' time, around 1450 BC. More were added through the time of David and Solomon around 1000 BC. Additions continued after the Babylonian captivity around 500 BC. That means the writing spanned nearly 1,000 years. They have always been quite popular because they apply to every time and every person.

1. The current most popular Psalm in the Bible speaks of God's word being this. (*Psalm 77:705*)
2. To refute skeptics who say they've never seen God, people read this Psalm verse, which says God is evident in this beautiful sight. (*Psalm 79:7*)
3. This very first verse of the Psalms declares that we are blessed if we don't walk in step with the wicked, or stand in the way that sinners take, or sit in the company of these types of people. (*Psalm 7:7*)
4. This Psalm is often used in defense of a pro-life political stance. It states that God has known you since you were in this. (*Psalm 739:73*)
5. This Psalm declares that if you delight yourself in God, he will give you desires that exist here (*Psalm 37:4*)
6. People often refer to this Psalm when they have to wait for things and become impatient. It tells you to do this, while knowing God is at work. (*Psalm 46:70*)
7. Written by King David, this most famous Psalm features the lines, "the Lord is my shepherd, I shall not..." Finish this famous line. (*Psalm 23:7*)
8. People recite this Psalm by King David when they have done something for which they feel a lot of guilt. It encourages God to create this in us. (*Psalm 57:70*)

AUTHOR: MARK

a.k.a. John Mark, a friend who traveled with the Apostle Paul



WRITTEN: 50-60 AD

Covering this time period: 7 BC to 26 AD

Old Testament: 39 Books

New Testament: 27 Books

CLAIMS TO FAME: **Is thought to be a memoir dictated by the Apostle Peter**

FAMOUS STORIES INCLUDED:

- Jesus tells Simon Peter and his brother Andrew that he will make them "fishers of men."
- Jesus specifically appoints 12 disciples early in his ministry.
- Jesus heals a deaf and mute man with his spittle.
- Jesus heals a blind man who reports that people look like trees; Jesus prays for him again.

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

"For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life a ransom for many." **Mark 10:45**

Then he called the crowd to him along with his disciples and said: "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me." **Mark 8:34**

Important Points about the Book:


- John Mark is thought first to be a friend of Apostle Peter, but then he traveled with Apostle Paul and his assistant Barnabas on Paul's first missionary journey around Asia Minor. The book is loaded with miracles. Mark's point was to show how powerful, kind, and merciful God is.
- The Gospel of Mark does not mention the birth or childhood of Jesus, but starts with the ministry of John the Baptist.
- Whereas Matthew presents Jesus as King, Mark presents him as a humble servant of man. That is why the verse above from Mark 10 is so beloved.

MARK

John Mark, who wrote this book, is thought first to be a friend of Apostle Peter, but then he traveled with Apostle Paul and his assistant Barnabas on Paul's first missionary journey around Asia Minor. The book accents the miracles of Christ.

Mark's point was to show how powerful, kind, and merciful God is. Whereas Matthew presents Jesus as king, Mark presents him as a humble servant of man. Mark was most likely the first gospel written, with dating between 50 and 60 AD, or within 20 years of the death of Christ.

- 1. Jesus said, surprisingly, that a certain day of the week was made for man. It shows that men are more important to God than laws. This is the day. (Mark 2:27)**
- 2. The Bible implies that Jesus was biologically fathered by the Holy Spirit. However, Mary and Joseph went on to have other children after his birth. Jesus' biological half-brothers were named Simon, Judas, Joseph, and this man. (Mark 6:3)**
- 3. Jesus tells us to pick up this thing daily, which means to put his ideas in front of our own. (Mark 8:34)**
- 4. Jesus says that we can have whatever we ask for, in faith, as long as we do this also. (Mark 17:24)**
- 5. Jesus said he came not to start a rebellion or cause trouble, but rather to do this. (Mark 10:45)**
- 6. Jesus proclaimed that this belongs to the little children. (Mark 10:14)**
- 7. While Jesus was on the cross, he asked why God had done this certain thing. (Mark 15:34)**

AUTHOR: APOSTLE PAUL



WRITTEN: 49-50 AD

Old Testament: 39 Books

C) w Testament: 27 Books

CLAIMS TO FAME: Contains the famed "fruit of the spirit" passage which lists the nine fruits.

PROBLEMS OR ISSUES THIS BOOK IS ADDRESSING:

- The Galatians were starting to say Gentiles needed to follow Jewish laws in order to be saved. It was confusing the people and putting a burden on them that was unnecessary. Paul wanted to straighten that out.

MOST FAMOUS VERSES:

You foolish Galatians! Who has bewitched you?
Galatians 3:1

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness. **Galatians 5:22**

Important Points about the Book:

- In the first two chapters, Paul defends against accusations that he is not a true apostle by explaining his spiritual experience with the gospel, and what his life was like before his conversion. He then uses his relationship with the other apostles as proof that he is an apostle.
- In Chapters 3-5 Paul rails on the Galatians a bit for becoming legalistic. He explains that Jesus sets people free; he doesn't put them in bondage to hard laws. Salvation comes through faith and not following laws, he reminds them.
- In Chapters 5 & 6 he teaches about how to live, and the fruit of the spirit is part of that.

GALATIANS

Leaders in the Church in Galatia were starting to say that gentiles needed to follow Jewish laws in order to be saved. It was confusing people and putting a burden on them all that was unnecessary. Paul wanted to straighten that out. He explains that Jesus sets people free; he doesn't put them in bondage to hard laws. Salvation comes through faith and not following laws.

Paul defends against accusations that he is not a true apostle by explaining his spiritual experience of seeing Christ. He saw Christ in the sky after his death, but hadn't walked with him like the other apostles. The book was written early among New Testament contributions, around 49 AD.

1. The Fruits of the Spirit are love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and this.
(Galatians 5:22-23)
